

Mauritania is a country in Northwest Africa. It is the eleventh largest sovereign state in Africa and the largest country lying entirely below an altitude of 1,000 metres (3,300 ft).

Mauritania is bordered by the Atlantic Ocean to the west, Western Sahara to the north and northwest, Algeria to the northeast, Mali to the east and southeast, and Senegal to the southwest.













The country's name derives from the ancient Berber kingdom of Mauretania, today Maghreb, located in present-day Morocco, Ceuta, Melilla and Algeria.









Its climate is extremely dry, which explains the low population density. Temperature differences can be very important between day and night. Coastal temperatures are warmer with sea winds and river regions are wetter. A sandstorm sometimes sweeps warm regions, burying crops or villages fighting the desert advance.

There are three seasons:

November-April:

The season of sandstorms, with moderate temperatures during the day and cool at night.



May-July:

The harmattan winds of the northeast, blowing dry hot air. Temperatures are high.



August-October:

Is the rainy season with thunderstorms and heavy but brief rains. The climate is very humid, with temperatures around 45 degrees. Humidity is between 50 and 70%.

History & Independence






One of Africa's newest energy producers, the Islamic Republic of Mauritania bridges the Arab Maghreb and western sub-Saharan Africa.

The largely-desert country presents a cultural contrast, with an Arab-Berber population to the north and Sub-saharan Africans to the south. Many of its people are nomads.

In the Middle Ages Mauritania was the cradle of the Almoravid movement, which spread Islam throughout the region and for a while controlled the Islamic part of Spain.





Approximately 90% of Mauritania's land is in the Sahara. As a result, most of its inhabitants live in the south of the country, where precipitation is slightly higher.

Arabic is the official language. French is also widely spoken, due to Mauritania's history as a colony of France. Mauritania's official religion is Islam, and almost all its inhabitants are Sunni Muslims. The country's largest ethnic group is the Bidhan who make up around half the population. The second-largest group is the Haratin who make up around one-third of the population. The rest of the inhabitants, for the most part, belong to sub-Saharan ethnic groups.

The country has abundance of natural resources. Its major industries include mining (particularly iron ore), Oil&Gas reservoirs, and fishing.

Mauritania port community & facilities

Mauritania has only two main ports, Nouadhibou and Nouakchott. The port of Nouadhibou has a mayor fishing activity and has a part dedicated to the artisanal fleet. The country's mineral wealth includes large reserves of iron ore, copper, and gypsum, all of which are now being exploited, as well as Oil/Gas upstream resources under imminent development in the south of the country.

Port of Nouadhibou



Nouadhibou has always been an important transit point for international transport.

Near the harbour is the terminus of Mauritania's only railway line, which mainly brings iron ore from the mining areas near Fdérik and Zouérat, which is located up to 704 kilometres (437 mi) inland.

Processing iron ore forms the largest industry in Nouadhibou, although the overall major economic activity is fishing.

SNIM NOUADHIBOU / Societe Nationale Industrielle et Minaire

SNIM mainly operates in the wilayas (regions) of Tiris Zemmour (Zouerate) and Dakhlet Nouadhibou. The ore is extracted and/or processed in the area surrounding the city of Zouerate, before being transported by ore freight train to the port of Nouadhibou

SNIM has been extracting and selling iron ore from the guelbs (small peaks) of Tiris in northern Mauritania since 1963. It mainly operates in the Zouerate area, where its extracting sites are located.

The company's products are transported to Nouadhibou Port, located 700km from the mine, using ore freight trains up to 2.5km long (one of the longest in the world), with gross tonnage of 22,000 t. From this deepwater ore port that can accommodate ships of up to 150,000 t, the company sends out tradable products to its customers, including in several western European countries and in China.

Benefiting from favorable weather conditions, the Nouadhibou ore port can accommodate 150,000-t ships.

Situated on the Levrier Bay, on the eastern coast of the Cap Blanc Peninsula, SNIM's port can accommodate 150,000-t ships. The access channel is maintained by regular dredging.

A rotary dumper with nominal capacity of 4,000 t/h.

An ore processing plant (tertiary and quaternary crushing).

A conveying and storage circuit.

A ship-loading circuit, equipped with a shiploader with capacity of 5000 t/h



SNIM's new ore port in Nouadhibou, will be able to accommodate, in the long term, 250,000 metric ton ore vessels. It consists primarily of a 403m wharf, an 800m bridge and a loading circuit with a ship loader whose throughput is 10,000 metric tons/hour.


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GREATER TORTUE/AMHEYIM Gas Project

At Greater Tortue, a Kosmos-BP partnership, is developing an innovative near-shore lique-fied natural gas (LNG) project that is among the lowest cost greenfield projects in the world.

The initial phase of the project is expected to deliver approximately 2.5 mmtpa of natural gas.

The partnership is also evaluating potential expansion up to 10 mmtpa in subsequent phases.





Greater Tortue Ahmeyim is an offshore liquefied natural gas (LNG) project based on upstream gas production in 2km-deep waters on the maritime border of Mauritania and Senegal.

Planned to be developed in phases, the Greater Tortue Ahmeyim LNG project will produce up to 10 million tonnes of LNG a year (Mtpa).

It is the deepest offshore project in Africa till date.

The LNG project is being jointly developed by BP, Kosmos Energy, Societe des Petroles du Senegal (Petrosen), and Societe Mauritanienne des Hydrocarbures (SMHPM) with BP as the operator.

A new well named Greater Tortue Ahmeyim-1 was drilled to a total depth of 4,884m in the eastern portion of the Greater Tortue area, which encountered 30m of net gas pay in high-quality Albian reservoir in July 2019. The new discovery indicates the potential to expand the capacity of the LNG project beyond 10Mtpa in future.

Greater Tortue Ahmeyim discovery and development background

The Greater Tortue
Ahmeyim project is based
on the development of two
offshore gas fields namely
Tortue and Ahmeyim.

The Tortue field, located in the C-8 block in Mauritania offshore waters, was discovered by the Tortue 1 discovery well, which was drilled up to a depth of 2.7km in 2015. The Ahmeyim field, located in Saint Louis Offshore Profond block of Senegal, was discovered by the Ahmeyim-2 discovery well, which was drilled up to 5.2km depth in 2016.


The Tortue 1 discovery well encountered 117m of net gas pay, while the Ahmeyim-2 encountered 78m of net gas pay.



The governments of Mauritania and Senegal signed an inter-government co-operation agreement to develop the cross-border Greater Tortue Ahmeyim offshore gas field in February 2018. Greater Tortue Ahmeyim ownership details.

The C-8 block offshore Mauritania is owned by:BP (62%), Kosmos Energy (28%), and SMHPM (10%).



Greater Tortue Ahmeyim gas reserves

Spread over 33,000km², the Greater Tortue Ahmeyim field is estimated to contain approximately 15 trillion cubic feet (tcf) of recoverable gas reserves.



Infrastructure facilities for Greater Tortue Ahmeyim phase one development

The Greater Tortue Ahmeyim field will be initially developed with a deepwater subsea production system comprising four gas production wells tiedback to a floating production, storage and offloading (FPSO) unit.

The gas will be processed for the removal of heavier hydrocarbon components on the FPSO. The processed gas will be further sent via a 100km-subsea pipeline to a near-shore floating LNG (FLNG).

The FLNG will be capable of producing 2.5Mtpa of LNG a year for global export. The remaining gas will be sent through pipelines to Mauritania and Senegal gas markets, for domestic consumption.

BP Gas Marketing will off-take the entire LNG output from the Greater Tortue Ahmeyim phase one development project.

Gimi FLNG details

BP signed a 20-year lease and operate agreement (LOA) for the Greater Tortue Ahmeyim FLNG unit with Gimi MS Corporation in February 2019.

Estimated to cost £1.02bn (\$1.3bn), the FLNG development involves the conversion of LNG carrier Gimi at Keppel Shipyard in Singapore.



GIMI MS will construct and operate the FLNG unit and invest 70% of its total development cost, while First FLNG, a subsidiary of Keppel Capital, provides for the remaining 30% of the project cost.



Contractors involved in Greater Tortue Ahmeyim LNG project

TechnipFMC was contracted for the engineering, procurement, construction, installation, and commissioning (EPCIC) of the FPSO unit for the project in March 2019. It followed a front-end engineering and design (FEED) contract for the FPSO awarded to the same company in April 2018.

Golar LNG is responsible for the construction and operation of the Gimi FLNG, while Keppel is engaged for the conversion works associated with the project.

Total and the Ministry of Petroleum, Energy and Mines of Mauritania have signed an agreement awarding Total two new exploration and production contracts for Blocks C15 and C31 deep offshore Mauritania, covering an area of 14,175 square kilometers. You can easily rent a car in Nouakchott, or through your preferred guide/tour operator. 4X4 cars would be prefferable.



- For visiting Mauritania, you must have a negative PCR test issued no later than 72 hours before your arrival.
- For exiting Mauritania, you will also need to be in possession of a negative PCR test, SafetyWing is one of the very few insurance providers with COVID-19 coverage.

Unsweetened curdled goat or camel milk; often accompanies food.



TOURIST DESTINATIONS



Declared a World Heritage Site, it is a stop and breeding place for migratory birds between Europe and South Africa, and therefore, one of the best observation points on the continent. It stretches 200 km north of Cape Timiris and 235 km south of Nouâdhibou. The best thing is to get up close to the birds in a traditional fishing boat.


ADRAR (Richat structure, the eye of Africa)



The undisputed jewel of Mauritania, it allows you to experience the magic of the Sahara and sleep under the starry sky in its saffron-colored dunes. This epic territory shows the great desert in all its variety: its immemorial cities, towering dunes like an artist's sculptures, vast rocky plateaus and peaceful oases lined with date palms.

Lively and colorful, it is the main attraction in Nouakchott, where you can see hundreds of men, mostly of the Wolof and Fula ethnic groups, dragging heavy fishing nets. Children scamper with trays of fish, which they select, gut, fillet, and put to dry on large trestles.
